[Hughes Hubbard's] knack for picking the right-sized opportunities has helped boost its pro bono score by 8 percent since 2005, to a near-perfect score of 199 this year. In recent years, the firm has turned its focus to complex and larger-scale pro bono matters, such as representing a group of immigrant women in a federal class action that challenged the failure of city and state agencies to provide public benefits to eligible immigrants. The success of that action, which settled in 2007 and has cost Hughes Hubbard close to 8,000 hours to date, whet the firm's appetite for larger matters. More recently, Hughes Hubbard represented 40 low-income tenants in a housing court action against the landlord of a Bronx building with more than 600 housing code violations, a project that required close to 1,500 attorney hours in 2010 alone. These larger projects haven't been revolutionary. Hughes Hubbard has long asked attorneys to complete at least 50 hours of pro bono service. But they made a difference in results. This year, the firm reported an average of 143 pro bono hours per lawyer, the third-highest average in The Am Law 200.

HUGHES HUBBARD OFFERS REAL PRO BONO OPPORTUNITIES

Trials

- The firm's pro bono Criminal Trial program provides associates with opportunities to defend indigent clients in criminal cases assigned by the New York Supreme Court. Through the program, Hughes Hubbard has scored major victories on behalf of indigent clients charged in a number of felonies, including assault, robbery, possession of weapons, arson, and possession and sale of drugs. In 2010, two litigation associates conducted a full jury trial on behalf of a client facing four felony assault counts and obtained acquittal on all counts.
- As pro bono counsel to the City of New York in three separate trials in 2011, Hughes Hubbard's litigators obtained jury verdicts in favor of the City and its police officers. In one of the cases, Hughes Hubbard associates represented an NYPD officer sued for \$100 million dollars by a plaintiff claiming that the officer used excessive force in shooting the plaintiff. After a four-day trial in July 2011, the jury returned a complete defense verdict in favor of the Hughes Hubbard client.
- Hughes Hubbard attorneys argued first impression pro bono appeals in the Second, Third and Ninth Circuits in the area of immigration rights. In the Second Circuit, Hughes Hubbard litigators had deportation orders vacated in two separate cases. One of these cases won the commendation of the Second Circuit and led to the lead counsel earning the 2011 New York State Bar Association President's Pro Bono Service Award.

Large-Scale Matters

- The firm represented 40 low-income tenants in a housing court action against the landlord of a Bronx building with more than 600 housing code violations, a project that required close to 1,500 hours in 2010 alone. The effort garnered the Legal Aid Society's 2010 Pro Bono Publico Award and resulted in an arrest warrant for the landlord, which, as *The New York Times* noted, was "a rarity in housing court."

Opportunities for Corporate Lawyers

- We represent The New York City Investment Fund in investments in local enterprises including 3rd Ward Holding LLC, a communal workspace located in Williamsburg, Brooklyn, which provides top-of-the-line creative resources to its members, including a wood and metal shop, photography studio, jewelry studio, media lab and all-encompassing educational programs.
- The firm represented the Second Avenue Business Alliance, Inc. (SABA), an organization of business owners located between 91st and 96th Streets on Second Avenue on the Upper East Side of Manhattan, whose businesses were affected by the construction of the new Second Avenue subway line. The organization was formed to raise funds through a variety of methods to support the affected businesses and to lobby on behalf of the neighborhood's interests before the New York City council and New York State legislature. The firm drafted SABA's bylaws and advised the organization on applying for tax-exempt status and other matters.
